This grant program aims to invest in the most promising research worldwide that addresses key research questions and areas of unmet need in Batten disease. Grants of up to USD \$50,000 will be awarded for one year, with the potential of renewal based on outcomes in the first year. Expressions of Interest will open on July 29.
